MBM Acquires 1936 International Wayne School Bus

A generous donor has donated what is now MRM's oldest bus. 1936 International School Bus. The bus comes to us from the Pacific Northwest. Originally operating for Hermiston Unified School District #8, the bus was later restored by Hendrick's Bus Company of Forest Grove, OR. The bus has been stored inside for the last 20 years. It made its nearly 2000 mile trek to MBM in the summer of 2023. Volunteers are currently working to restore the bus to running condition and evaluation wood repairs that will need to be completed at the base of the windows. Midwest Bus Museum is a 501c3 Not for Profit Organization, all donations are 100% tax deductible.





Checker Motors Corporation 100th Anniversary Celebration

On May 30th, 2022, the Midwest Bus Museum (MBM) was happy to host a 100th anniversary celebration of the iconic Checker Cab and the Checker Motors Corporation at MBM Wisconsin.

Checker Motors Corporation was a vehicle manufacturer and tier-one subcontractor located in Kalamazoo. Michigan. It manufactured the renowned American taxicabs used by Checker Taxi. Morris Markin established the company in 1922 —initially named the Checker Cab Manufacturing Company - in Chicago through a merger of Commonwealth Motors and Markin Automobile Body. The manufacturer moved to Kalamazoo in 1923 and was renamed to "Checker Motors" in 1958.

Checker made the iconic American taxicab, highly regarded by taxicab companies for its durability in heavy use. Special features included wide rear doors, large rear seats and trunks, and jump seats for two extra passengers. The company had trouble competing with fleet discounts offered by the larger manufacturers, as well as economies of scale in procuring components. The final models were produced in 1982. After 1982, Checker invested significantly in the third party manufacturing business, serving GM and Chrysler.








Checker Event (Cont'd)

On January 14, 2010, the Checker Motor Company closed its doors for good ending 88 years in the automotive field.

The MBM and Internet Taxi Cab Archives (ITCA) coordinated the event with over 50 Checker cars attendance, as well as many "one-offs" coming out for rare appearances. Guests travelled from all over the world to attend the event, and we were also honored to host families from France. Australia & England. The MBM was able to give tours, rides, and showcase the various generations of all of bus transportation classes that shared the busy streets of America with the Checker cab. It was a memorable weekend with friendships formed, museum grounds tours, car & bus fantastic cruises, and а dinner banquet.











The Jail Bird

On March 2, 2024, members of the Midwest Bus Museum traveled to Canon City, Colorado to pick up a 1987 Chevrolet C60/Bluebird Bus. While the museum has several examples of this combination, this one was out of the norm and was specifically built for a rough and tough service life.

The State of Colorado ordered this bus to transport prisoners to and from other penitentiaries and to work gang outings. In its final years, it was used for a prisoner run horse camp called "WHIP" (Wild Horse Inmate Program). She is equipped with a 8.2 liter Turbo Detroit Diesel, Allison MT653, & Air Brakes. After 36 dedicated years to the State of Colorado, she was finally retired and replaced. A goal of the MBM is to diversify its collection of buses in order to showcase how builders have outfitted buses for a variety of needs; this old '87 is a perfect example.

Members arrived in Canon City on March 2nd and started pre-trip inspections and small repairs. MBM's Vice President Emerson Zentz had been in contact with representatives of the Department of Corrections, and they assured us she was a runner and was a reliable bus ready for travel. That evening, we positioned her in front of

the old prison to take some final pictures, and we hit the road for Denver. The morning of March 3rd we had an appointment to replace a few questionable tires, and after those, we had a measly 1,100 miles back to the MBM grounds lol. In the famous song by the late great Jerry Reed, we were "East Bound & Down loaded up and bussing!" We asked a lot out of that old bus in the next 21 hours driving non-stop and only turning her off twice to check fluids. We drove all day and through the night, arriving back at 8am on March 4th.

The old Jail Bird didn't miss a beat and we now look forward to showcasing her in upcoming events.
